Autism and Neurodevelopmental Center: Ribbon Cutting Ceremony

The Arc of the Ozarks Autism and Neurodevelopmental Center celebrated its new facility with a ribbon cutting on February 6, marking a significant advancement in autism care. The initiative, supported by a substantial \$5 million grant, is set to impact over 40,000 children in the coming decade. Missouri's First Lady, Teresa Parson, underscored the importance of this center by attending the ribbon-cutting ceremony, highlighting the community and statewide support for the project.

The center serves children and families through evaluations, behavioral analysis, psychological/psychiatric services, and speech, occupational, physical and specialty therapy services.

"We are so excited to bring these multidisciplinary evaluations to the community and this facility will be a game changer for individuals with autism and other neurodevelopmental issues." said Dr. Kyle John, Medical Director.

The center is a collaboration between The Arc of the Ozarks, Mercy Hospital, and Missouri State University. Support from local organizations and government, legislative representatives, the Missouri Department of Mental Health, and the Governor's Office is crucial for ensuring the success of the center.


The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints made a \$46,000 donation on behalf of Teresa Parson's nonprofit, the Moving Missouri Forward Foundation, which funded exam chairs and cabinets for two exam rooms as well as equipment for the occupational therapy/physical therapy gymnasium.

What is a Multidisciplinary Evaluation?

Utilizing a multidisciplinary team is best practice when conducting autism evaluations. Our team consists of psychology, psychiatry, social work, occupational therapy, speech therapy, and applied behavioral analysis to work together to clarify diagnosis and develop an individualized plan for implanting appropriate support. Team members involved in your evaluation will be based on your unique needs. Our family advocate and diagnostic coordinator assist in providing families with community-based resources and support during and after the evaluation process.







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Disability Rights Legislative Day 2024

On Wednesday, March 13th, hundreds of Missourians with disabilities and other advocates arrived at the Missouri state capitol in Jefferson City for the Disability Rights Legislative Day Rally.

We were excited to bring 50 of our clients and their staff to be a part of this momentous day and represent The Arc of the Ozarks. This day is all about people with disabilities coming together to talk to their legislators about issues they face every day in their own lives and advocate for change. Challenges that were being discussed by individuals with disabilities were: affordable transportation, employment, affordable housing, and support for their direct support staff or their providers.

Before the rally started, there were opportunities

to meet with the legislator from their district. There were also exhibits and tables from businesses who work with the disability community throughout the state. At these exhibits and tables, attendees collected valuable information and learned about different programs available to them.

The rally began with the powerful chant of hundreds of people yelling "We Are Here," the theme of this year's rally. Representative Melanie Stinnett, The Arc of the Ozarks Vice President of Therapy Services, kicked off the rally with a short speech about her incredibly important pieces of legislation, "Employment First" and "Ticket to Work."

The rally also included speeches from other legislators and self-advocates who told their stories. This day is an important piece to advocation as it is a chance for everyone to get their voices heard and to have an impact on legislation. One of The Arc's clients in community living had the opportunity to attend this year and said, "It is important so people know their rights and know that they can work just like anyone else and have the right to vote."

Marcus, a Family Advocate at The Arc, believes that Disability Rights Legislative Day is an "opportunity to encourage civic engagement from a population whose voice is often overshadowed."

Marcus continued, "Missouri is lucky to have several representatives who work to understand the needs of the intellectual or developmental disability (I/DD) community. Our best hope is that, through participation, our program participants will find their own voice and cultivate their own path to civic engagement."
