

Celebrating a Milestone in Autism Care: New Facility Ribbon Cutting

On February 6, 2024, The Arc of the Ozarks Autism and Neurodevelopmental Center marked a significant advancement in autism care with the grand opening of its new facility. The event featured a ribboncutting ceremony that celebrated the commitment to serving children and families through comprehensive, evidence-based care.

The center provides a wide range of services, including multi-disciplinary evaluations, behavioral analysis, psychological and psychiatric care, as well as speech, occupational, physical, and specialty therapies. Since opening, the center has achieved remarkable milestones:

"We are absolutely thrilled with the level of care we have brought to our community. Children and adults who would have otherwise needed to travel and experience long wait times, now can stay closer to home for needed services," stated Dr. Kyle John, Medical Director.

Located in Springfield, Missouri, the Autism and Neurodevelopmental Center offers comprehensive care for individuals across the autism spectrum and those with other neurodevelopmental conditions.

Making Progress: Jack's Journey

Early on, Jack's parents noticed signs that prompted them to seek an evaluation for autism or other developmental disabilities. However, they faced a daunting three-year wait at another center, meaning Jack would likely have been in kindergarten before receiving a diagnosis. While he was receiving limited services in Springfield, nothing was coordinated. His mom, Ally, knew there had to be a better way.

When The Arc's Autism & Neurodevelopmental Center opened in Springfield, everything changed for Jack and his family. The center provided a streamlined process for assessment, diagnosis, and treatment.

"The assessment process took about two hours, and then they sat down with us and explained everything," Ally shared. "Jack is currently receiving speech, occupational, feeding, and music therapy. The process has helped not only him but me in understanding what he needs."

The impact on Jack has been remarkable. When asked if she has seen significant improvement, Ally said, "Significant doesn't even come close. They have helped me help him." She explained that Jack's progress has been transformative: "Jack used to only eat Uncrustables, and now he can eat many other things. He went from very few words to sentences. On his 4th birthday, I scheduled therapy because I knew that's where he wanted to be."

Ally emphasized how much The Arc's staff has supported her family, saying, "They have taken so much stress off me and are so accommodating with my schedule. I would recommend them 100%."

Thanks to the Autism & Neurodevelopmental Center, Jack's future looks brighter, and his family has found the guidance and support they needed to help him thrive.

The Arc of the Ozarks' Kansas City Division is committed to empowering individuals with disabilities to achieve greater independence and live fulfilling lives. Through a variety of tailored programs and services, they strive to make a meaningful difference in the community. Their key offerings include:

- Community Support: Helping individuals integrate into their communities by providing resources and guidance to enhance daily living skills and encourage social participation.
- Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA): Using evidence-based behavioral interventions to improve social, communication, and learning skills. This program is particularly beneficial for individuals with autism spectrum disorders.
- Family Advocacy: Assisting families in navigating the complexities of disability services, ensuring access to essential resources and empowering them to advocate for their loved ones.
- **Community Living:** Providing residential services that promote independence in safe and supportive environments tailored to individual needs.

Each of these programs is delivered by a dedicated team of trained professionals who are passionate about enhancing the quality of life for those they serve.

The Arc of the Ozarks is proud to continue its legacy of service and community partnership in Kansas City. We look forward to expanding our impact and fostering greater inclusion and opportunities for individuals with disabilities.

Exploring Infinite Possibilities

The Arc of the Ozarks has expanded its educational offerings with the addition of Infinity Academy, joining the Rivendale Institute of Learning and the Rivendale Center for Autism in providing specialized services for students with disabilities.

Infinity Academy is a private school in Ozark, Missouri designed to meet the educational needs of middle and high school students who require an alternative to traditional schooling, including those with developmental learning differences. Infinity Academy operates year-round and is currently accepting new enrollments. The academy offers flexible options for students including full-time, part-time, and in-home programs to accommodate varying needs.

"This acquisition underscores our commitment to provide an alternative to traditional schooling and meet the unique needs of students who want high standards for academics but need a non-traditional pace and more one-on-one attention" said Alisa Lowry, The Arc of the Ozarks Vice President of Programs.

One student who was able to join Infinity Academy in the 5th grade has been able to thrive in this individualized environment. When he started at Infinity, he often felt overwhelmed by the busy environment of public school, which would lead him to shut down and not be able to accomplish his work. Because of this, he was performing two grades lower than expected. Fast

forward two years since being enrolled at Infinity Academy, his confidence in school has grown significantly, and he is now caught up to his own grade level of learning.

When asked about his experience at Infinity, the student said, "I feel like I have more time to work. I am not rushed. The work seems easier because I get to work at my own pace. The biggest thing is, I feel comfortable here."

As the number of children diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder continues to rise, the integration of Infinity Academy into The Arc of the Ozarks expands its comprehensive services for students with autism, learning disabilities, and gifted students. This acquisition supports The Arc's mission to empower individuals with disabilities to direct their own lives as valued members of the community.

Innovative Mental Health Solutions: Interventional Psychiatry

Interventional psychiatry is an emerging subspecialty that leverages advanced, evidence-based treatments to address mental health conditions, particularly those resistant to traditional therapies, such as medication and talk therapy. By directly influencing brain activity, these cutting-edge techniques aim to alleviate symptoms and improve patient outcomes.

The Arc of the Ozarks Autism and Neurodevelopmental Center is at the forefront of interventional psychiatry, providing a comprehensive suite of services, including:

- Transcranial Magnetic Stimulation (TMS): A non-invasive procedure that uses magnetic fields to stimulate specific brain regions involved in mood regulation. TMS is an effective treatment for depression, with options such as Traditional, Deep, and Theta Burst TMS available.
- Magnetic e-Resonance Therapy (MeRT): Currently in its pilot phase, MeRT utilizes EEG-guided TMS to assess brainwave activity, pinpointing areas that may not function optimally. This personalized, drug-free treatment is designed to enhance neural communication and improve mental health outcomes.
- Esketamine (Spravato): Designed for adults with treatment-resistant depression, this innovative nasal spray is administered alongside an oral antidepressant to address persistent depressive symptoms effectively.
- Cranial Electrotherapy Stimulation (Alpha-Stim): This therapy stimulates brain regions responsible for serotonin production while calming areas associated with fear, making it a valuable tool in treating depression and anxiety.

The center also offers pharmacogenomic testing through the GeneSight Psychotropic Test. This test analyzes an individual's genetic makeup to determine how they may respond to commonly prescribed psychiatric medications. This personalized approach helps clinicians select the most effective treatments for each patient.

By integrating these advanced interventional psychiatry services, The Arc of the Ozarks Autism and Neurodevelopmental Center reinforces its dedication to providing innovative and personalized mental health care tailored to meet the unique needs of each individual.



Meet Kylei

Kylei is a remarkable young woman who balances the demanding life of a full-time college student, works two jobs, and maintains a loving relationship with her long-time boyfriend, AJ. However, her journey to this point has been anything but easy.

Kylei's struggles began at the age of 16 when she attempted suicide for the first time. "I was always involved in everything—an active social life, sports, and school," Kylei said. But as she entered puberty, something shifted. She became deeply depressed and found herself lacking the energy and motivation for even the simplest daily activities. Her battle with depression led her to drop out of college after her first year.

AJ, her steadfast partner, vividly recalls a harrowing moment when he found her unresponsive at home after she failed to show up for work. "That day, I saved her life," AJ shared. "I worried about her 24/7."

During one of her hospitalizations, Kylei met Dr. Kyle John, now the Medical Director at The Arc of the Ozarks Autism & Neurodevelopmental Center. Dr. John referred her to Dr. Raymund Tan, a psychiatrist who became instrumental in treating her prolonged battle with depression.

After trying numerous medications without success, Dr. Tan recommended Spravato (esketamine) treatments. "When you have few options left for severe depression, Spravato can be lifesaving. Unlike many traditional antidepressants that take weeks to work, Spravato can provide noticeable improvement in depression within hours or days of its administration," stated Dr. Tan. This innovative approach proved to be a turning point in Kylei's life.

"After my first treatment, I felt like I had found myself again," Kylei said. "The little kid in me came back. I was at a point of no hope, and this treatment changed my life. Dr. Tan has been with me since I was sixteen and never gave up on me. My parents have PTSD after years of ups and downs, but now my dad isn't scared to answer the phone anymore. This treatment is truly a lifechanger."

Today, Kylei's story stands as a powerful testament to the resilience of the human spirit and the transformative impact of compassionate care and innovative treatment. Her journey inspires hope for those battling similar struggles, showing that with the right support, it is possible to reclaim one's life and thrive.

A Recipe for Inclusion

In 2024, The Arc celebrated the success of Ruvim, a dedicated advocate and author. Ruvim, a Community Connections client, turned his passion for accessible cooking into reality with the publication of *The Accessible Cookbook*, a resource designed to make the kitchen a more welcoming space for all abilities.

On December 16th, Ruvim hosted a book signing event at the Library Center, where he connected with the community, shared his story, and sold over 40 copies of his cookbook. His cookbook features easy-to-follow recipes and QR codes linking to video tutorials.

Throughout his journey, Ruvim's Program Supervisor, Rachel Shuman, has been an advocate and supporter, assisting him whenever challenges arose and ensuring he had the resources needed to succeed.

Reflecting on his journey, Ruvim said, "It's never too late to start if you want to. The really important thing is to start somewhere." He continued, "I feel like some people are intimidated about starting, but as long as you start somewhere, you will get better at it."

Empowering Independence

Through The Arc's partnership with HEARO Technologies, 44 individuals utilized remote supports in 2024.

Missouri's Developmental Disability waivers offer Remote Support systems, enabling individuals to receive assistance without direct staff presence. This includes technology like home sensors, telephones, and communication devices for additional support, as well as safety monitors for tracking movement and health, such as activity sensors and temperature monitors.

Roommates JoJo and Catie utilize remote supports in their home from 11 PM to 7 AM. These supports monitor their home through window and door sensors, as well as communication devices in their bedrooms. JoJo and Catie also have reminders set to administer their medications and complete their hygiene routines independently. When asked about remote supports, Catie said, "I like the reminders to pass medication, and when I called them, they came to the house to help."

Soon, JoJo and Catie will begin utilizing remote supports as early as 8 PM due to their success over the past year. Remote supports are an invaluable service provided to individuals who receive support from The Arc and can help foster greater independence.



My Cause My Cleats

Jennie has been heavily involved with Special Olympics Missouri, and in 2024, she was honored with a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. Jennie was selected with others to design cleats for George Karlaftis, a defensive end player for the Kansas City Chiefs, through the Special Olympics Athlete Leadership Program. Jennie traveled to Kansas City to meet George, learn more about the project, and ask him questions to inspire her cleat design ideas. Jennie worked hard on her design, and just a few weeks later, she had the exciting chance to return to

Kansas City for the big reveal. The cleats turned out wonderful, showcasing elements from the designs of all the Special Olympics Athletes. During this trip, Jennie had the opportunity to tour Arrowhead Stadium, where George revealed one final surprise for the athletes- tickets to the Chiefs vs. Raiders game, where he proudly wore the cleats they had designed. Prior to the game, George said, "It will be awesome to have them at this game because they will be cheering harder than anyone else."

Advocating for Change

The Think Differently Database
Act passed the senate in December
2024 and headed to the President's
desk to sign. This act will require the
Department of Health and Human
Services (HHS) to create an online
clearinghouse for resources tailored
to individuals with disabilities and their
families. The database will provide
localized, searchable information on
Medicaid services, health care, mental
health care, and other critical supports.

"The Think Differently Database Act creates a comprehensive website that provides organization to muchneeded resources that benefit those with disabilities. My son, Stephen, inspired me to go into public service, and fighting to improve the lives of those with disabilities is one of the most important facets of my job. I'm extremely pleased this bill passed the Senate, and I look forward to the President signing it into law," said bill co-sponsor, Senator Eric Schmitt.

The legislation aims to reduce barriers to care by offering streamlined

access to reliable, community-specific resources. The Arc of the Ozarks advocated for its advancement to improve accessibility and support for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

In the summer of 2024, Governor Parson signed the state budget, finalizing the Fiscal Year 2025 spending plan. This budget includes a provider rate increase for developmental disability (DD) providers, establishing a minimum wage of \$17/hour. This increase has been instrumental in helping organizations like The Arc of the Ozarks remain a competitive employer, enabling us to attract, hire, and retain the Direct Support Professinals vital to supporting our clients in living and thriving within their communities.

This measure has also been a significant step in addressing the workforce crisis that providers across Missouri have faced in recent years. We sincerely thank Governor Parson for his dedication to supporting Missourians with disabilities.

Empowering Voices: Disability Rights Legislative Day

Attendees met with legislators, explored resource exhibits, and joined the rally's powerful "We Are Here" chant. Representative Melanie Stinnett, The Arc's Vice President of Therapy Services, spoke on vital legislation, alongside other lawmakers and self-advocates. Marcus, a Family Advocate at The Arc of the Ozarks, emphasized the event's role in amplifying voices and encouraging civic engagement.

Marcus said, "Our best hope is that, through participation, our program participants will find their own voice and cultivate their own path to civic engagement."
